Greetings from the School of Law!

Dear Friend,

Last year, the IU School of Law participated in a pilot study of law student engagement. The study was designed by Patrick O'Day, one of our third-year law students and a PhD candidate in education psychology. O'Day surveyed more than 4,000 students at 11 schools, including Duke, William & Mary, and Wisconsin. The pilot survey generated a lot of interest, and this spring, all law schools in the nation have been invited by the Association of American Law Schools to participate. For us, the first findings were heartening. Our students expressed greater satisfaction with the quality of their education than their counterparts at other participating schools.

Our first-year students in particular were more likely than students elsewhere to report that their experience at the Law School contributed to acquiring a broad legal education, to acquiring work-related skills, to writing clearly and effectively, to developing legal research skills, to working effectively with others, to understanding people of other racial and ethnic backgrounds, to solving complex real-world problems, and to contributing to the welfare of their communities.

The law involves so many skills, not all of which are best developed in the classroom. This survey underlines the importance of programs such as journals, clinics, Moot Court, and student groups — all of which are entirely supported by your generosity — in producing not just satisfied students, but good lawyers.

Shearer to speak on international law



[Ivan Shearer](#), the Challis Professor of International Law at the University of Sydney, will be in Bloomington from Jan. 25 through Feb. 21 as the George P. Smith Distinguished Visiting Professor-Chair. On Feb. 2, Shearer will give a public lecture, titled "In Fear of International Law," in which he will look at current international events where governments have been reluctant to acknowledge the applicability of international law or have failed to justify their positions in relation to international law. During his visit, Shearer will also meet with student groups, give guest lectures in classes, and be available for consultation on issues relating to international law.

Law School celebrates 50th anniversary of landmark decision

May 17, 2004, marks the 50th anniversary of the landmark Supreme Court case on desegregating public schools, *Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka*. To commemorate this decision, the Law School is planning a series of events throughout the spring semester. These events will include student presentations on the meaning of *Brown v. Board* today; a library display; a panel discussion of the international law influences on *Brown v. Board* and the international impact of the decision; a workshop, featuring Gary

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Orfield of the Harvard School of Education, on the use of social science in the law; a visit by civil rights litigator Alvin Chambliss; a screening and discussion of the film *The Road to Brown*, which analyzes the legal strategy that Charles Hamilton Houston and Thurgood Marshall devised to bring *Plessy's* separate-but-equal rule before the Supreme Court; and (tentatively) the reading of a new play, *Now Let Me Fly*, about the relationship between Houston and Marshall.
