FORMER I. U. LAW DEAN, ENOCH G. HOGATE, DEAD

Bloomington and Danville to
Pay Last Respect.

WIDELY KNOWN IN STATE

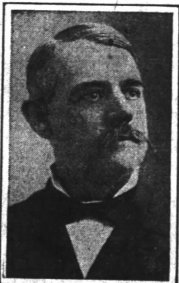

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., September 2.—Enoch George Hogate, age seventy-five, dean emeritus and for many years connected with the law school of Indiana University, formerly a resident of Danville, also a leading Republican of the state and at one time grand master of the Odd Fellows of Indiana, died at his home here Sunday morning as a result of illness which began in March, 1917, when he was stricken while lecturing before a law class at the university. At that time Judge Hogate, as he was familiarly known, suffered a stroke of apoplexy which left him partly paralyzed. He regained his health to some extent and for some months was able to be about, then his condition gradually became worse until death. After he was stricken he was never able to appear in the classroom, and in August, 1918 he resigned as dean of the law school.

Rites in Three Cities.

Funeral services for Judge Hogate will be held at the home here this afternoon at 3 o'clock in the charge of Dr. C. C. Flynn, pastor of the First Methodist church, of this city. The body will then be taken to Danville, where services will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The burial will be at 3 o'clock, Tuesday afternoon, at Crown Hill cemetery at Indianapolis in charge of the Odd Fellows.

near Centerton, N. J., in 1849, and the family moved to Danville when he was fifteen years old. He attended the Danville Academy for two years, afterward being graduated with honors by Allegheny College at Meadville, Pa., in 1872. After graduation, he took up the practice of law at Danville. In 1884, he was elected clerk of the Hendricks county court and was elected to the state senate in 1894. He was made grand master of the Odd Fellows of Indiana in 1892. In 1903, Judge Hogate joined the law faculty of Indiana University and in 1908, at the death of Judge George Reinhart, he was made dean of the Law School.

Was Twice Married.

Judge Hogate was married twice. His first wife was Miss Nay J. Mattlock, of Danville, who died. His next wife was Miss Anna C. Houston, of Danville. He is survived by three children, Miss Jessie May Hogate, of this city; Charles D. Hogate and Mrs. Mary L. Clements, of Indianapolis. Judge Hogate was a member of the Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity, vice-president of the Bloomington National Bank, a member of the Bloomington Chamber of Commerce, a member of the general conference of the Methodist church, a member of the American Bar Association, a member of the Indiana Bar Association, a trustee of the Indiana Village for Epileptics, and author of the book, "Indiana Pleading and Practice," which has a high standing in the legal profession.
