SEX LIES AND THE ARTS: THE CULTURE WARS FROM MAPPLETHORPE TO THE BROOKLYN MUSEUM

James F. Fitzpatrick, an alumni of IU Law School, will present his lecture "Sex, Lies, and the Arts: The Culture Wars from Mapplethorpe to the Brooklyn Museum" on Thursday, Nov. 16 at 7:00 p.m. in the Moot Court Room. The event is co-sponsored by The Kinsey Institute, The Friends of Art, The Friends of Art Bookshop, and the IU School of Law.

The intense scrutiny of the role of public and private funding for the arts in the 90's was book-ended by two highly controversial events; the Robert Mapplethorpe retrospective, "The Perfect Moment," in 1989 and the Brooklyn Museum exhibition, "Sensation" in 1999. Mr. Fitzpatrick is a Senior Partner with the Arnold Porter firm in Washington, D.C. He will discuss legal ethical, and practical aspects of funding for the arts to the accompaniment of slides of works from the two exhibitions. Lessons for the future regarding rights of free speech of the artist, the proper role of government funding of the arts, and the legitimate rights of a public who is upset over art that the government might fund are drawn from the debate.

Regarding Mayor Guiliani's unlawful cancellation of support for the Brooklyn Museum, Fitzpatrick states, "Everybody has equal rights of free speech, including those who don't like some of the art. But when a city cuts off funds to a city museum, the ultimate danger is to a free society."

Professor Fred Cate moderated the second in a series of meetings of senior U.S. and German government and business leaders concerned with electronic commerce in Berlin; he moderated a panel on Public Records and Privacy and participated in a roundtable about privacy policy issues as part of the Privacy 2000 conference in Columbus, OH. He also spoke about privacy and other information law issues to the Life Insurance Marketing Association's annual meeting in Atlanta, the National Retail Federation's Privacy Council in Washington, DC, and the legal staff of Household International in Chicago. His book chapter, "Public Policy and the Privacy Avalanche," was published the last week of October in *The Future of Financial Privacy*.
