OBITUARIES

Willis C. Nusbaum, one of the foremost tax law attorneys in Indiana, died Sunday, October 1st, at his home in Indianapolis. He served as special counsel for the state board of tax commissioners six years, and after resigning that position he became affiliated with the Indiana Taxpayers' Association as special counsel. Mr. Nusbaum practiced law in Goshen and Warsaw before coming to Indianapolis, where he opened an office in 1907.

Theodore E. Slinkard of Bloomfield died Wednesday, October 4th at the Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis, where he had been taken several days ago. He served as judge of the Greene circuit court for six years. For the past few years he has been engaged in the practice of law at Spencer.

Noble C. Butler of Indianapolis died at his home Saturday, October 7th, 1933. He served as clerk of the federal circuit court in Indianapolis until it was abolished in 1912, and then was clerk of the district court in Indianapolis until his retirement five years ago. Mr. Butler also taught at the Indiana Law School.

Silas A. Hays, believed the oldest practicing attorney in Indiana, died at his home in Greencastle. At the time of his unexpected death, October 5th, he was president of the Putnam County Bar Association.

Silas A. Canada, of Winchester, Indiana, died October 4th. Mr. Canada was admitted to the Randolph County bar in 1877 and became a member of the firm of Stakebake, Canada and Marsh. He served as a member of the state legislature for two terms.
