Carl J. Kollmeyer, Columbus attorney, died at his home April 14. Mr. Kollmeyer had practiced law at Columbus for 40 years. He attended Concordia College at Fort Wayne. He was a member of the Bartholomew County Bar Association.

John Eugene Iglehart, historian and attorney of Vanderburg County, died at his home April 18. He was a member of the Vanderburg County Bar Association. He practiced law at Evansville 65 years and was one of the organizers of the Southwestern Indiana Historical Society.

E. S. Griffin, Elwood attorney, died April 19. He studied law at Spiceland Academy. Attorney Griffin was a member of the Madison County Bar Association.

William V. Rooker, Terre Haute attorney, died suddenly at his home April 21. He was a member of the American Bar Association. Mr. Rooker was a graduate of De Pauw University.

Clifton R. Cameron, former judge of the Marion county municipal court, died in Michigan City, April 26. Mr. Cameron graduated from De Pauw University in 1886. He was a member of the Indianapolis Bar Association.

Elmer Leonard, Fort Wayne attorney, died at his residence April 29. He was a graduate of the University of Michigan where he studied law. He was a member of the Allen County Bar Association.

Evan W. Heath, Covington attorney, died at his home April 29. He was a former mayor of Covington and practiced law for many years.

LeRoy M. Wade, former Mt. Vernon attorney but in recent years of Chicago, died at Chicago, May 2. Mr. Wade had taken a prominent role in the legal profession in Mt. Vernon for twenty-five years, later practicing law in Vincennes for five years and at the end of that time becoming an attorney in Chicago.
