

JUDGE A. B. CARLTON IS DEAD.

**Indiana Jurist, Formerly Law Partner
of Daniel Voorhees, Passes Away
at Terre Haute.**

Terre Haute, Ind., Sept. 5.—[Special.]—
Judge Ambrose B. Carlton, who died at his
home in this city today, was born in Bedford,
Lawrence County, Dec. 18, 1825, where as a
youth he was a pupil of Richard W. Thomp-
son, who became Indiana's "Old Man Elo-
quent" and Secretary of the Navy. Later he
graduated from the law department of the
Indiana University and became a professor
of law in the institution.

He was elected Judge of the Common Pleas
Court at New Albany for two terms and after-
ward was appointed Judge of the Circuit
Court in 1873 by Governor Hendricks, from
which position he resigned to become the
law partner of Daniel W. Voorhees in this
city. When Mr. Voorhees went to the Sen-
ate in 1877 Judge Carlton and John E. Lamb
formed a partnership, which continued until
1881, when President Arthur appointed Judge
Carlton a member of the Utah commission,
which position he held for seven years.

Since then he had resided in Terre Haute.
For several years he had been blind. He
leaves a widow and four daughters, one Mrs.
Edward McKeon of Chicago, and one son,
Charles Carlton, the New York representa-
tive of the San Francisco Call's Press asso-
ciation.
