## Much Honored Professor Ranked Superior As Law Instructor and Scholar

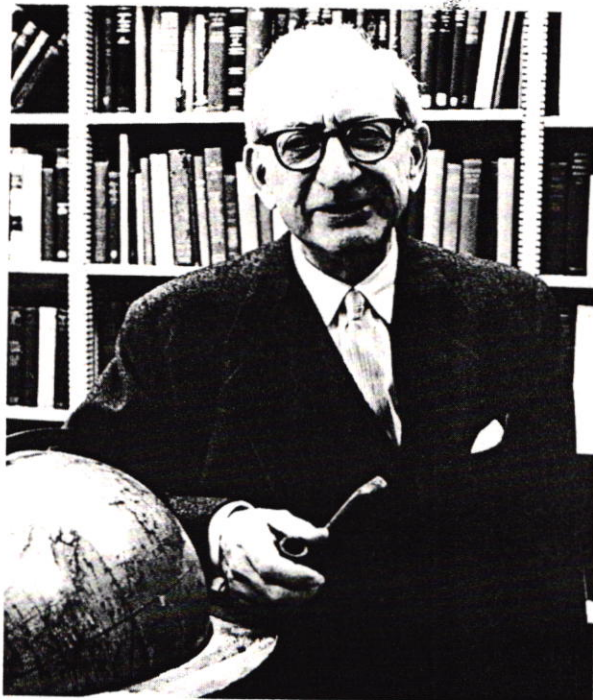
These are typical answers received from students of Jerome Hall, Distinguished Service Professor of Law at Indiana University, when questioned about his teaching. They reflect his dedication and skill in the classroom, his broad legal philosophy, and the kind of man he is. They show, too, why he was one of the first winners of the University's Frederic Bachman Lieber Memorial Award for Distinguished Teaching. Of all his honors—and he has many, national and international—the Lieber Award is the one he always emphasizes when discussing his accomplishments.

### Students His Main Interest

Dr. Hall delights in developing trained thinkers. He says that he works hardest in the classroom. He enjoys immensely his criminal law course for School of Law freshmen, for it gives him the opportunity to guide young minds and to see them grow in disciplined skill under his tutelage. Success of his former students is important to him, and he likes to talk about the many who report regularly to him from all parts of the state and nation.

A native of Chicago, Professor Hall holds doctorates in law from Chicago, Columbia, and Harvard universities. In 1958 the University of North Dakota recognized his distinguished career with an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

Soon after graduation from the University of Chicago, Dr. Hall practiced law in Cook County, Ill., and served there as an assistant state's attorney. During this period (1924-29) he also held his first job with Indiana—an instructorship in public speaking and business law at the University's Northwest regional

campus. Later, before coming to Bloomington, he taught at North Dakota and Louisiana State. He was awarded the University's highest faculty rank, Distinguished Service Professor, in 1957.

Criminal law and legal philosophy are Professor Hall's specialties. His books and articles in these fields have made his name and that of the University known throughout the world.

In 1954 Dr. Hall was selected by the U. S. Department of State to assist in the legal reconstruction of Korea. During his work there he was made a member of the Korean Bar and is an Honorary Director of the Korean Legal Institute. While in the Far East, he also lectured in Japan, Formosa, the Philippines, and India. A Fulbright lectureship has taken him to the University of London and to Queen's University in Belfast, Ireland; and as Ford Foundation lecturer in 1960 he visited Mexico and most of the South American countries. In 1961 Dr. Hall gave seminars in legal philosophy and criminal law at Freiburg University, Germany. Institutions of higher learning in this country call on him frequently to give endowed lecture series.

### Worldwide Recognition

For services to the legal communities he has visited Dr. Hall has received many honors in addition to those already mentioned. Among these are the honorary presidency of the Latin American Sociological Association; honorary member of the Arequipa, Peru, and La Paz, Bolivia, Bar Associations; the highest rank of the Order of San Francisco by the University of San Paulo in Brazil; and membership on the board of di-

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
